We currently can't afford to set money aside

I currently am a SAHM, my husband is working and is enrolled in the teacher's retirement scheme. I will join a superannuation scheme when I start paid employment in the future

I am managing because I have some savings to supplement the pension.

Trying to pretend its not going to happen

I'm on a Income Protection Claim - won't be eligible for Kiwi Saver as I don't work, and am not likely to be able to work. I will face severe difficulties in retirement

too far away for me to worry about yet

I am over 65 and receiving the "Super" but I am still working full time

My seven children have said they will look after my wife and I.

I have not made any plans for my retirement, as I'm still trying to work out how to afford my first house!

I'm hoping I'll have enough with state pensions and some UK pensionfunds, but it's probably too late to start saving now.

I have thought about it but my current situation makes it hard to save towards retirement.

I have an employer contributing scheme already as well as a private scheme

we have residual income from NM

Although I'm managing now, we have a child with a severe disability that will be with us for longer than would be ususal. I worry about what we'll have to retire on.

I am discombobulated by the high NZD and my oseas funds

I'm 71 and as we were careful over the years we are now reasonably comfortable.

In a subsidised work scheme

I have an existing scheme but due to parental leave stand-downs it does not have in it what it would have.

It's a long term concern, but at least I'm thinking about it now!

We have an accountant because we run a business and have our own retirement plans

I am fortunate to have Govt Super at 58!

I am retired and find the existing income comfortable

Have suffered significant injuries, on ACC and have used my savings to live on until ACC FINALLY agreed to provide what they were legally obliged to do!!!!

Still young enough to do something about it. Came to NZ only 6 years ago.

Thought about, not done much about it, trying to set up for the first bit before getting too much done on the last bit.

I've had superannuation savings for over 10 years

Have joined an existing workplace scheme but don't know if it will be enough for a comfortable retirement

taking every day as it comes

I am confident IF the government doesn't penalise people for taking the initiative themselves fo rtheir future (eg managed funds, property, shares etc) by introducing other taxes such as

capital gains tax etc.

Looking at other investment options which provide greater return

I'm in a super scheme at work and have been for 8 years - this is why I probably won't join Kiwi Saver. This super scheme should put me into a comfortable zone when/if I retire.

We have a super scheme in place with my husbands job and are saving the maximum possible for our retirement. We will be comfortable when he retires.

I'm self-employed so my income varies greatly - sometimes I just have enough to cover the bills with none left over for even thinking about retirement or even short-term savings.

I am retired, and made good provision by both of us saving hard, as well as my GSF annuity. I am a national Exec Member of the Govt Superannuitants Assn, and give advice on such matters.

If I don't start soon I will face sever financial difficulty in retirement

Maybe I should start buying rentals

I currently am a apart of a superannuation scheme

I retired in 1989, but was forced to find casual work as the eligability rules for National Super had been changed, and I did not become eligible for another 7.5 years. My wife, who is also retired, and I do the best we can on NZ Super, and our savings.

Every now and then I think about it and it scares me so I put it on the back burner

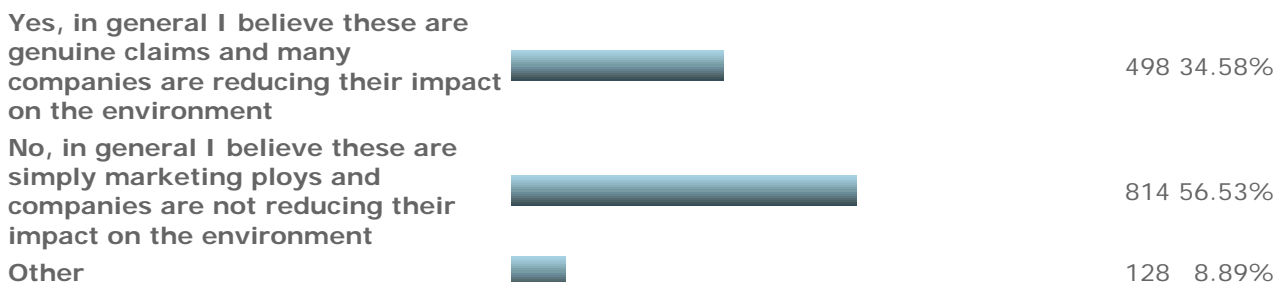
